



Windows XP Support is Ending




As of April 8, 2014 Microsoft will stop providing support for its Windows XP operating system (OS), the software that supports almost **one in three**¹ computers. Security updates and patches will no longer be available, and any payment systems and computers still running XP will be vulnerable to attacks.



